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

suggestions to management by house organist Dennis James, the Wurlitzer is becoming recognized as an important part of the "Paramount Theatre experience." For the Paramount's 75th anniversary month, the Wurlitzer was used before and during the Tony Bennett show, for Bob Ralston's "God Bless America" program and the silent film Wings accompanied by Tedde Gibson.

From The MAILBOX

he following letter from Esther Geddes McVey is in response to the article published in May about the Robert Morton pipe organ being installed by Don Wallin in the Merlyn & Walter Johnson home in Tacoma. That Pipeline passed through several hands before reaching her in Rancho Mirage, CA. Thanks, Esther for sending your interesting story! See more about this instrument on page 5.

Greetings;

I was greatly interested in the story about the "new" theatre organ Don Wallin is installing for the Johnsons in Tacoma. I was a part of that organ's history and was pleased that the story sent to [PSTOS members] Lee and Barbara Wells and then given to George Churchill in Lacey, WA, was sent to me.

When the organ was in the Indian Theatre in Roseburg, Oregon, I used to do a radio "happy hour" of organ usic from there and will never forget the day during a broadcast in the darkened empty theatre when I looked down to my right and saw the hugest rat I ever imagined about six feet away on the floor seemingly mesmerized by the organ music. I thought if it moved, I would go off the air without warning! But when I played my closing theme and looked nervously down, the musical rat had disappeared.

My husband and children used to get free admission to shows from Don Radabeau if I played for fifteen minutes or so before the show.

I had acquired the job of organist at the Methodist Church when I was a twenty year old (precocious I guess) teacher at Sutherlin High School and the church acquired a Hammond organ and found out that thirteen miles away was a teacher who had studied organ with Leon F. Drews of Portland (he did radio shows from the Heathman Hotel). So the Music Committee chairman provided transportation for me to come play for services and a vesper program and finally married me (and saved the gasoline). Then I became the organist and later also the choir director (with my left hand) while playing the organ.

When I heard the organ in the Indian Theatre was going to be disposed of we managed to raise ten thousand dollars to move it and have it installed in the church, and we also had the bass and snare drums and marimba and a few other theatrical effects removed. We kept the chimes and of course the original ranks.

Pipe organ was and still is my music obsession and I still do some piano and organ teaching. When my new husband (for thirty one years) Tyler McVey, long time old radio and TV and stage actor, and I do re-creations of old time radio shows, I am usually responsible for the theme music etc. We have enjoyed being guests at the REPS (Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound) in Seattle at the end of June for many many years at which time the wonderful surviving actors who were part of old time radio get together and enjoy the fans, many of them quite young, who still think radio is the theatre of the mind, and television is the theatre of the mindless.

Sorry this is such a long letter—my husband Tyler McVey says I can say in a thousand words what he can say in ten. Alas.

Oh, and the George Churchill who forwarded the story to me was a tenor in the really quite good choir we had for many years.

My cousin's husband Frank De Lepinasse in Woodburn, Oregon, is a long time organ enthusiast, I think a member of the American Guild of Organists, and I am wondering is perhaps he is involved with your group at all.

PIPE ORGAN Terminology

en Chamade pipes

(pronounced ahn shaMOD)

A rank of loud reed pipes located outside the pipe chambers in the auditorium, usually clearly visible.

These are usually very loud and powerful pipes, generally a member of the trumpet family, used to accent or punctuate a full organ sound.

A perfect example of en Chamade pipes are the brass trumpet pipes mounted horizontally high in the room in the Wilcox Wurlitzer home in Gig Harbor. They are used sparingly and will instantly wake a dozing listener!

Pages From The Past..

The May Pipeline told of the Robert Morton pipe organ being installed in the Tacoma home of Merlyn and Walter Johnson. This project, masterminded by Don Wallin, is progressing well.

A brief overview of the instrument's interesting history: Installed in 1924 in Roseburg Oregon's Indian Theatre, it was removed to a Methodist Church in 1944. The church was destroyed by a bizarre and tragic accident when a parked truck loaded with explosives

caught fire and exploded, killing 13 people and demolishing much downtown Roseburg including the church. The organ somehow survived and was moved to Leonard Vernon's Astoria home.

Mr. Vernon's home was visited by many well-known organists. In February of 1962 these articles appeared in a local newspaper telling of a 1962 ATOE Regional meeting which included the use of the Robert Morton pipe organ.

Theater Organ Enthusiasts to Meet in Astoria

Members of the American Theatre Organ Enthusiasts [now American Theatre Organ Society] from Western Canada, Washington and Oregon will meet this Saturday in Astoria.

The ATOE was featured this week in Time Magazine as one of the finest organ clubs in America.

About 100 members and friends are expected to attend the all-day, all-night meeting. Reginald Stone from England and former organist of the BBC, but now living in Vancouver, B.C., will be the featured organist, during this event. Members will register at the home of Leonard Vernon and there be treated to silent movies accompanied by Stone on the Vernon Robert-Morton theatre pipe organ just as it used to be done in the 20s. After the movies, and everyone has had a try at the organ, the members of the Puget Sound Chapter will move their operation down to the Sea Fare for a banquet, business meeting and election of officers.

From the Sea Fare the group will then be entertained by another of its members, Dave Newman, owner of Radio Service. Newman is a collector of antique mechanical musical instruments.

Finally the group will meet at Bill Blunk's Viking Roller Rink and again hear Stone on the great five manual Marr and Colton theatre pipe organ. After the concert there will be an all night jam session by members of the club.

It is expected that there will be many well known organists from the Pacific Northwest attending.

Guest Organist Thrills Members at ATOE Meeting

The first regional quarterly meeting for 1962 of the American Theatre organ Enthusiasts was held in Astoria Saturday, February 10. [1962]

The members first met at Leonard Vernon's residence to register and hear his Robert Morton theatre pipe organ.

Minutes before the program was to start, a telegram was received stating that the English organist, Reggie Stone, who was to be the guest artist for the afternoon, could not attend. Bill Blunk filled in at the organ console to get the afternoon program started, after which members took their turns. Many of the members of ATOE have

There were 90 people registered at the Vernon home, and when the festivities ended there, they moved to the Sea Fare restaurant. After a banquet dinner, the 1962 officers were elected. Leonard Vernon was elected secretarytreasurer and Bill Blunk was elected chairman for the Pacific Northwest, which encompasses Oregon, Washington, and British Columbia, Canada.

Don Baker the guest artist for the evening, was then introduced, a real surprise to the 82 members at the banquet. Three short movies were shown, the last of which featured Don-Baker playing a sing-along movie in 1937— a surprise to both Mr. and Mrs. Continued next page.

The meeting then adjourned to the basement of Radio Service Company where David Newman showed and played for the guests many mechanical musical instruments, calliopes, merrygo-round organs, music boxes and theatre pit organs.

At 10 p.m. all members converged at e Viking roller rink, where after the skating session was over the huge Marr and Colton theatre pipe organ console was rolled to the center of the floor under the spot lights. At this time the featured artists of the evening, Don Baker, took command of the fivemanual pipe organ. Baker, Capitol recording artist, is well known both in America and Europe for his concert tours. For 12 years he was solo organist for the Paramount Theatre in New York City, and has made countless record albums, movie shorts and was organist for many radio shows.

Baker entertained approximately 125 members and guests on the big rink organ with an hour program of music which had never been heard in this area according to those present. The audience was emotionally moved by his keyboard artistry and organ orchestrations.

After the guest artist had performed, he mighty pipe organ was played continuously until 4 a.m. Sunday morning by other members of ATOE.
