Seattle's University Presbyterian Church gets new pipe organ

Thanks to member Kathy Swedberg for sending this interesting news about a new and exciting pipe organ in our area

The organist at University Presbyterian Church shed tears of joy when the console for the church's new pipe organ was unloaded last September from a semi-trailer outside the church. And she was "blown away" by the number of volunteers lined up to help unload the thousands of organ parts. Volunteers hauled more than 111,000 pounds of organ pipes, blowers, wind chests and other parts into the church. Some of the largest pipes required four persons to carry them. When two more trucks arrived from the Reuter organ factory in Kansas ten days later, the scene was repeated. About 7,000 pipes were carefully carried into the sanctuary, laid in pews, along aisles, on the front platform, in the lobby—anywhere there was room.

Assembly began by a team of Reuter's employees and specially hired workers. By early October, the initial installation was complete and the tedious tuning and voicing began.

Jo Ann Stremler, the organist, says she is overwhelmed with gratitude that the church has invested in this instrument of such grandeur and significance. Special concerts and guest performers will be thrilling, but her greatest joy will come from leading congregational singing with the new instrument.

Dan Sharp, Minister of Worship and Music, believes the instrument will have an impact not only on the city of Seattle, but the entire Northwest. It will draw some of the top organists from around the world to bless listeners with outstanding recitals. Even local school children will come to the church on field trips to view and hear the new instrument.

FACTS & FIGURES:

- 79 stops, 104 ranks, four manuals
- 80 visible pipes: flamed copper and silver
- Largest of the 2,200 organs built by Reuter Organ Company
- Console weights 800 pounds
- Manuals: white keys are covered in cow bone; dark keys are rosewood; pedal "naturals" are maple, pedal "sharps" are rosewood with ebony caps
- Memory: extensive system of presets
- Total cost: \$1.4 million (already paid in full!)

He was delighted to find out via your web site that the Pantages organ he loved so much is alive and well. He especially liked Oliver Wallace because he was a "real showman", often

jumping off of the console to interact with the vaudeville acts on stage. My mother was a Glen Shelley fan. She will be delighted to see the info on him recently posted on your web site. You have made a an elderly couple of ex-Northwesterners very happy. Please keep up the good work.

My program at the Westminster







Hokum Hall Wurlitzer report

Work continues at a feverish pace on the Hokum Hall WurliTzer. Ten plus ranks and the tuned percussions are installed, winded, wired, and playing with preliminary voicing under the direction of chief organ guru Bob White. Plans are underway to add a few more ranks, depending upon what can be shoehorned into the shrinking space available at the hall. The unique BecWurliTVar relay system is up and running with implementation of the CrowTronic coupling and second touch module, and work will begin soon on the Lehneflex 2000 combination action system.

Hokum Hall has announced its first Y2K fully compliant program series during February. "Musica Curiosa" will feature a changing program of unusual and unique musical instruments, including "trial run" appearances of the WurliTzer. Dennis James will be on hand for a number of shows, bringing among other things PDQ Bach's epic composition, "The Little Pickle Book" for WurliTzer and dill piccolos, with audience participation required.

In the spring, programming will be expanded to include more traditional theater organ events, and some PSTOS and guests–exclusive events. A gala "dedication" of the Hokum Hall WurliTzer is anticipated, also this spring.

Reservations are encouraged to assure seating at the increasingly popular Hall shows. Several fall shows were sold out with late arriving patrons turned away. Phone 206-937-7912 for reservations.
