
1924 - 2004


Tony Fenelon to perform in Spokane Friday, May 14

Tony will play the historic 1914 Seattle Liberty Theatre Wurlitzer now located in First Church of the Nazarene in Spokane on Friday, May 14th at 7PM. A first for Spokane, Tony will put the instrument through its paces with a full theatre organ program including a short silent movie. Pizza and homemade soups will be available for \$2 per slice or bowl starting at 5:30 in the church's large family center. The program will begin at 7:00. Pages From The Past..

One of Seattle's grand old theatres was demolished in 1967 to make way for the Washington Plaza Hotel

The fixtures, equipment and art objects of the Orpheum Theater will be auctioned June 26 and 27. [1967]

Greenfield's Auction Galleries will sell the goods for the Clise Agency, which retained title to the equipment and fixtures when the Orpheum Building was sold to Western International Hotels as site for the Washington Plaza Hotel.

The auction will be held in the theater, beginning at 10 a.m. June 26 and 1 p.m. June 27.

Jim Greenfield of the auction firm said everything will be sold that can be "unscrewed, chiseled or blasted loose or otherwise detached from the theater building, up to and including the marquee and the wrought-iron fencing along Fifth Avenue."

One of the major items will be the massive pipe organ, some of the pipes of which, Greenfield said, are "larger than the average living room."

Up for auction the first day will be the equipment and fixtures, including screen, projectors, theater seats, motors, lights and even the plumbing and wiring.


The second day's sale in general will feature art objects including paintings, special furniture, sculpture and vases.

Greenfield said even the marble wall paneling will be sawed free to go on the block. Demolition of part of the Orpheum Building already has begun. The theater itself will be knocked down as soon as the goods are auctioned and removed.

. his pipe dream needed lots of room—and found it

Bob Koons' pipe dream has become Big Bob's Pipe Dream Restaurant, finally.

Koons has transplanted the Wurlitzer pipe organ, once played in Seattle's Coliseum Theatre, to his new pizza restaurant at 630 S.W. 153rd St. He has owned the instrument more than 20

The organ, with 32 sets of pipes, filled seven rooms above the Coliseum stage after it was installed in 1918 at a cost of \$72,000.

Originally it was used 12 hours a day, seven days a week, providing music for silent films and vaudeville acts. But when talkies came along, theatre organs generally fell into neglect and disrepair. The Coliseum organ was no exception.

The console and some of the pipes entually were removed and placed in storage. The Coliseum Theatre building became the property of the Bullitt family,

which for some time attempted to sell the organ to someone who would rebuild it. But theatre organs hardly could be given away. Many of them fell under the wrecking ball when theatres were torn down.

Mrs. Dorothy Bullitt gave title to the organ to Koons in 1953. He had to look for a larger house to find space for the organ parts and it wasn't until 1967 that he had all of the organ in his possession.

Koons said he first got the idea for the organ-pizza combination during a trip to California several years ago. He obtained a small organ from a theatre in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, and installed it in an earlier restaurant in Federal Way.

With the rebirth of pipe organ popularity in pizza restaurants, Koons began to search for a new home for the old organ, now valued at about \$80,000.

He found the old Burien Theatre with

Chambers to house the pipes were built across the 60-foot front of the theatre. A 27-foot ceiling allows room for even the tallest of pipes, and the room is large enough so the organ does not sound confined, Koons said.

After more than five months of rebuilding, the organ's 15-horsepower blower was turned on and the instrument came to life after 35 years of silence.

The organ is played daily at 6 p.m. and Koons plans to add silent movies to return the old organ to its original role.

Now that the restaurant is open, there will be a little more room around the Koons home.

"I have lived around this organ for nearly 23 years. You could hardly walk through the basement because I had parts stacked everywhere," Koons said.

About Tony Fenelon...

It was inevitable from an early age that music would play a significantly major role in Tony Fenelon's life. As a child, he showed astounding talent, but faced an enviable dilemma—with a talent for music and a passion for electronics, he had to decide between the two. So he enrolled in a Science degree at Melbourne University while also studying part time at the Conservatorium of Music.

Completing a Bachelor of Science degree, he commenced full time work as a medical electronics engineer at the Royal Melbourne Hospital, a career that culminated in his appointment as head of the Department of Biomedical Engineering in October 1991.

Tony's insatiable interest in music and a love of the majestic sound of the theatre pipe organ led to his "other" career, leading to his appointment in 1965 as the resident organist at Melbourne's then prestigious Regent Theatre. He held this post until the organ was removed, prior to the closure of the theatre in the early seventies. It seemed that the Regent was doomed and, in spite of many proposals for the development of the site, the theatre lay dark and neglected until its magnificent restoration and the gala reopening on Saturday August 17th, 1996.

With increasing overseas and local requests for Tony's performances, he reached the milestone decision in June 1998 to relinquish his biomedical career in favor of a full time involvement with music. Now an internationally acclaimed artist, Tony has completed over twenty major concert tours overseas, performing on piano and pipe organ.

In 1999, Tony returned to his old stamping ground to be featured in the Inaugural Concert of the Regent Theatre's "new" Wurlitzer Pipe Organ. This concert was an overwhelming success, drawing an unprecedented record attendance since the civic reopening of the Regent. In February 2002 Tony was invited back to do a repeat concert with American organist Jonas Nordwall, and in February 2003, Tony was again featured in his own solo concert at the Regent The-

Tony has to his credit 22 recordings and 4 gold records. In his concerts, he strives to provide a tasteful balance between popular tunes, light classics and music from the films, stage, jazz, and great standards.
