### How many people does it take to process YOUR membership? And your dues check? It's amazing! So why do we sometimes goof? Read on...

Recently a member found herself frustrated, and justifiably so! Although she had paid her dues, she received in her Pipeline a "pink slip," a polite reminder that her dues check had not been received.

This incident caused all the Board to realize our "system" is complex, and it's a wonder more goofs don't occur!

#### Here's how it works:

- A new member joins PSTOS by sending a member application and check to Treasurer Norman Miller.
- · Norman processes the check, and notifies Jo Ann Evans and Doug Owen of the new member.
- Doug processes the name badges and mails them with a welcoming letter.
- Jo Ann enters the new member information in the master database, and emails an updated version of the database to Bob Zat.
- Bob Zat generates and mails Dues Reminders from this database, according to expiration dates.
- Members receive their Dues Reminders and send their checks to Treasurer Norman Miller.
- Norman processes the checks, and sends the reminder forms to Jo Ann who updates the master database with any changes including the new expiration date.

- Jo Ann designs and processes the Pipeline, and generates mailing labels from the master database.
- •When printing labels, she checks for members whose dues appear to be unpaid. They will find a"pink slip" taped inside their Pipeline!

#### So what can go wrong?

Everyone of these folks is a volunteer, and a busy one at that, who fits PSTOS tasks in as they can. Example: if Bob Zat is planning a trip (his job often requires it) he may be late mailing Dues Reminders. But Jo Ann doesn't know that—and if there is a PSTOS event early in the month (case in point, the coming Pipe Organ Factory Tour on Oct. 9) the Pipeline may be published before the database has been updated. It may appear to her some dues have not been received when in fact, they may be on Norman's desk!

#### Please have patience with us!

We do honestly try to be certain nobody gets a pink slip if they've paid. And if we goof, we're truly sorry!

# Pages From The Past.. 1971

## Retired theatre organist keeps busy playing organ

When Gaylord Carter voluntarily ended his long reign as organist for the Los Angeles Lakers this season [1971], many thought it was a big mistake. He was only 66, and what he had in mind was going on the road with a silent film, "The Winning of Barbara Worth."

Carter, who will play the mighty Wurlitzer organ in the Paramount Theatre at 8 o'clock tomorrow night while the epic Sam Goldwyn movie unreels, isn't a bit sorry about his decision. He has a six-month lease on the film, and he's got the best of all possible worlds—"Medicare and fun."

"Besides," he says, "I no longer have to wonder what to play when the Seattle Sonics come on the floor in the Los Angeles Forum. The best I could ever figure to do for them was "Heaven help the foes of Washington..."


Carter is one of a handful of theatre organists to become nationally famous. Another would be Seattle's own Oliver Wallace, of "Hindustan" fame, who went on to become musical director for Walt Disney and stayed until he was 75, dying just two weeks after retirement.

In 1932, Carter was "house organist" at Seattle's Paramount. He loved the city and audiences liked the way his fingers created the proper mood to go with the screen's romance, humor, death and assorted catastrophes.

During Franklin D. Roosevelt's first campaign for the presidency, Carter was chosen to play the National Anthem for the candidate's speech to a Seattle audience.

The University Rotary Club is sponsoring Carter's "Barbara Worth," which has received smash reviews from normally blase Los Angeles movie critics. Although it was filmed in 1926, the Henry King-directed silent flick remains a monumental chunk of celluloid, based on bringing irrigation to California's Imperial Valley.

When "Barbara Worth" originally opened in Los Angeles 45 years ago,



Carter recalls that he was playing a theatre organ down the street for another epic, the silent version of "Ben-Hur."

"Barbara Worth" stars Ronald Colman and Vilma Banky, along with a newcomer who showed up at Culver City, Calif., one day and said "Yup" he was interested in becoming an actor. His name was Gary Cooper and Sam Goldwin signed him for "Barbara Worth" when the actor who was supposed to play the second male lead failed to show up.

Cooper's contract, a copy of which Carter produced, paid \$50 a week, with the provision that Cooper furnish his own wardrobe, right down to his shoes and underwear.

Carter, who began playing theater organs when he was 16 "because I didn't have a dime to go to the movies," says the film opens with a great sandstorm and ends with the catastrophic breaking of a dam that wipes out the valley. And Carter will stack up

his sandstorm and catastrophe music against anyone's.

In between the hell and high water, there is a love triangle between Miss Banky, Colman and Cooper. Carter won't tell who wins the girl, but "you must remember that Cooper was the 50-buck-a-week newcomer."

King, the director, literally built a city on location in the Black Rock Desert of Nevada, transporting equipment, food, housing and severalthousand actors across trackless wastes in a logistics exercise worthy of a Second World War general.

Carter has had several months to develop his accompaniment since the film was pulled out of the storage can in which it had languished for so many years. But he still improvises at times. He opens with a theme he wrote and calls simply, "waving fields of grain," describe the blooming of the soil.

Carter admits to going mildly berserk at the keyboard during the sandstorm. He switches to a Spanish theme for the "love stuff," because the three principals are supposed to be talking in Spanish. Try "Yup" in Spanish sometime.

The organist unashamedly pulls out all the stops for the flood scene, which he describes as "Furioso No. 17" music. There is nothing more dramatic in Carter's repertoire. He might faint dead away if he attempted No. 18.

It is Carter's hope that he blends music with action so skillfully that audiences get caught up in the drama and forget the part the organ is playing in their excitement.

Thanks to a strong Theatre Organ Enthusiasts of America organization in Seattle [PSTOS today!], the Paramount's 22 rank Wurlitzer is in mint condition, Carter says. All he asks is good equipment. He can do the rest.

The trick in accompanying silent films is anticipating the action. The



organist has a fleeting moment to capture the mood musically. To look away from the screen, even momentarily, could be disastrous. Doing background music not long ago for the silent film, "Ella Cinders," Carter missed a bell-ringing scene. He played "ding-dong" on the organ at the conclusion of the film, "because I didn't want the audience to feel cheated."

Carter likes Seattle. He thinks Seattle will like "Barbara Worth" and the 1920s sing-a-long that precedes the opening curtain.

It's C-rated. C, for Carter.





#### Dave Wickerham thrills audience at Wurlitzer Manor

The lucky folks who heard Dave play at Wurlitzer Manor will agree—he played a completely different theatre pipe organ program, and may be one of the most high-energy performers around. His offerings were up-tempo and rhythmic. Toe tappers all the way.

It was his first visit to the Pacific Northwest. He'd heard much about the Gig Harbor Wurlitzer and was eager to play it. Arriving on Friday, he had two days to rehearse, and found many seemingly brand new sounds and combinations.

He fell completely in love with the Wurlitzer, and agrees with other welltraveled organists that it is one of the finest residential installations in the country. Folks certainly received their money's worth, a full two hour riveting performance, plus three encores.

Folks came from as far away as
Eastern Washington, Oregon and
Canada to hear this outstanding
organist. One member said he knew it
would be a terrific program because
he's heard Dave twice previously...and
wouldn't miss him for anything!
Attendance was less than usual, lending
to a more intimate setting, shorter
intermission 'lines,' and less vehicle
congestion. If you are one of those
who missed this event, shame on you!

Many thanks to Dave for his electrifying performance. Those who attended will certainly be first in line to purchase tickets when he returns!


### Young Daniel Goltz plays outstanding program in Tacoma

Our PSTOS scholarship recipient, Daniel Goltz, recently played a marvelous classical organ recital for the "Third Fridays at Noon" series at Christ Church, Episcopal, in Tacoma. Daniel is just 17, but plays at an amazingly mature level. His program nsisted of music by J. S. Bach and Jacques

When only 12 he began organ studies with Dr. Kraig Scott, faculty member and College Organist at Walla Walla College.

Daniel has won a dozen gold medals competing in both the piano and organ divisions of Spokane's annual *Musicfest Northwest*, and took second prize in the Spokane Chapter, A.G.O., Regional Competition for Young organists. His organ studies are being completely financed by our PSTOS scholarship program. He is a high school junior and serves as organist for First Presbyterian Church in Walla Walla.



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


#### **RETURN SERVICE REQUESTED**



Martin Pasi served a four-year apprenticeship with the Rieger Company in his native Austria before immigrating to the U.S. in 1981. He then worked with several organ builders before opening his own shop in 1990. He has completed 14 instruments located in residences, institutions and churches ranging in size from 2/7 through 3/55. They are located all over the U.S. and in Canada. He currently has three more under contract including a 3/41.

Martin oversees all phases of building his organs, including design, manufacturing, voicing, and installation. All components of the instruments are built in his shop. The company employs a small group of fine craftsmen.



Paul Fritts began working in his father's pipe organ shop when only 15 years old. After 14 years, he partnered with Ralph Richards to begin building mechanical action instruments. Together they built eight organs between 1980 and 1986, at which time Paul became the sole proprietor. The firm's twenty-sixth organ was recently installed at Tompsen Chapel at St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle.

Study trips to Holland, Germany, Spain, and France have greatly influenced the direction of Fritts' work. He and nine associates build mechanical action, classically inspired organs at the Tacoma shop, and recently completed a large and impressive instrument for the University of Notre Dame.
