Our PSTOS Scholarship recipient sends greetings and a current report of his progress and activities, including news of his upcoming September concert in Seattle

ar PSTOS Members,

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Society for their ongoing support of my organ studies and give an update on my progress and some exciting upcoming events. You have helped make it possible for me to continue developing my musical talents and your assistance is much appreciated.

First of all, I would personally like to invite the PSTOS members to a full concert that I am presenting at St. Mark's Episcopal Cathedral at 3pm on September 18th. This large parish is located at 1245 Tenth Avenue East in Seattle.

The organ at St. Mark's is an instrument of international reputation that was installed in 1965 by the Dutch builder Dirk Flentrop. This beautiful instrument, at four manuals and 58 stops, is one of the largest mechanical action organs in all of the United States. It was extremely influential during the organ reform movement of the 1960s and 1970s and helped establish guidelines for many well-known contemporary builders. The organ is blessed with a wonderfully reverberant large room and is a 'veathtaking instrument both visually and

arally.

I will be playing a very diverse program, with music from the Dutch composer Sweelinck to Seattle native William Bolcom, and the program will end with a complete Vierne Symphony. This will be a great opportunity to see the progress that I have made and be able to hear some wonderful music. Tickets are available for advance purchase at (206)-325-6500, www.ticketwindowonline.com, or in person at The Cathedral Shop.

This August I will be traveling to Colorado State University to attend a theatre organ workshop taught by Jonas Nordwall. Being primarily a classically trained musician, this will be a great opportunity for me to get "outside the box" and learn more about theatre organ music!

For what promises to be a busy summer, I will also be attending the Mount Royal College Conservatory International Organ Summer Academy in Calgary, BC. During this intensive summer school, I will be studying with several well-known performers and teachers and also performing in several concerts.

For the past year, I have been head organist at First Presbyterian Church in Walla Walla where I play on a historic threemanual E.M. Skinner from 1915. This valuable instrument is the fifth oldest entirely unaltered Skinner in existence. The organ (and its organist!) was featured in the July/August issue of the internationally



I am finding more time to practice now that school is out and my junior year in high school is finally completed!



Scholarship grant approved for young student's attendance at the Colo. St. Univ. T. O. Workshop taught by Jonas Nordwall

My name is Nathan Avakian. I am 13 years old and very interested in the theatre organ. I can play by ear, and began lessons with Donna Parker about a year-and-a-half ago. Pages From The Past..

Many thanks to PSTOS Charter Member Bob Jones for providing the original opening night program for Seattle's Fox Theatre, later named 7th Avenue, Music Hall, and in the 1970s, the Emerald Palace.



Above is the cover from the original opening night program of the Seattle Fox Theatre, April 19, 1929. The theatre was originally named the Mayflower and as such, had a nautical theme. It is unknown if it ever actually operated under that name because it was called the Fox Theatre during most of the early years.

During the 1930s, the name was changed to 7th Avenue Theatre and then to Music Hall Theatre. In the 1970s and '80s, the house operated as a dinner theatre and 'mixed-use' house under the name Emerald Palace.


The four manual, 16 rank Robert Morton (opus 2375) was installed by Balcom & Vaughan in 1929, with the console mounted on a unique revolving lift. The opening organist was Jamie Erickson, who at the time was well known in the large movie palaces throughout the West and Mid-West. The last regular organist was Eddie Clifford.

The last public performance of the Music Hall Robert Morton was given on November 15, 1963 with popular

Seattle organist Dick Schrum at the console. A sound clip of Dick's music can be heard on the PSTOS website by going to http://www.pstos.org/instruments/wa/ seattle/music-hall.htm

In June of 1964, the large instrument was sold for \$7,500 and moved by Balcom & Vaughan for a cost of \$3,500 to the Carl Greer Inn in Sacramento, California. It operated there for a number of years and then was sold to a private party in Southern California. The organ was stored for over 20 years but never installed.

In 2002, the organ was purchased for installation in the Bob Hope (former Fox California) Theatre in Stockton, California. According to Randy Warwick, the installation was spearheaded by Bob Hartzell and organ tech Dave Moreno with help from Kenny Crome and numerous Sierra & Nor Cal ATOS Chapter members plus "Friends of the Fox."

The extra service will be included in the parking tariff. Each attendant is carefully trained and understands the handling of all motor vehicles. To insure absolute protection for the property of all patrons, each employe has been bonded






PARKING THREE HOURS TWENTY - FIVE CENTS

Not only does the instrument have a full complement of theatre voices, but also has a complement of classical voices "in a box," as Don explained. As a result, the organ is supremely versatile.
